7. Evaluate the difficulty in arriving at a consensus on criminal
8. Distinguish the electronic data and other resources which store timely and useful criminal justice information in order to locate and investigate research data.

5. Identify reasonable cause and probable cause situations relevant to Fourth Amendment search and seizure law, and determine the need for a warrant.
6. Identify court proceedings from pre- trial, to trial and conviction, to after conviction, and during times of crisis.
7. Comprehend the constitutional and statutory rights of criminal offenders.

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#### LAW211 - Business Law I

1. Explore criminal law, intentional torts, constitutional law and contract law.
2. Distinguish between criminal and civil law and have an understanding of their interrelationship.
3. Analyze a contract from a legal perspective.
4. Ability to apply legal and ethical principles to their current and future careers.
5. Ability to identify and analyze ethical dilemmas within a business legal environment.
