

UNDERGRADUATE TO GRADUATE PATHWAYS

Tiffin University offers graduate courses that count as dual credit toward both undergraduate and graduate degrees. This opportunity allows students to finish their graduate degree program faster and save money. After completing these bridge courses and graduating with a bachelor's degree from TU, students will be able to complete their graduate degree in fewer credit hours as well as qualify for Tiffin University's alumni tuition discount on remaining graduate courses.

ELIGIBILITY AND REQUIREMENTS

- Students must have a 3.0 cumulative GPA to be eligible for the Undergraduate to Graduate Pathways program.
- Students must be at senior standing with 82 credit hours completed to begin bridge courses.

UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE → MASTER OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

- Open to all majors
- Format: On campus or online
- Required courses: 16 courses (36 credit hours)
 - For undergraduate business majors MGT515 and MGT516 are waived, making it 14 courses (32 credit hours).
- Bridge courses:
 - If eligible, students can take up to four classes as an undergraduate to apply toward their MBA (up to 10 credit hours).
- Concentrations offered: leadership and change, forensics and fraud examination, data analytics, sports management, finance, international business, healthcare administration, human resource management and marketing

UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE → MASTER OF EDUCATION

- Open to all majors
- Format: Online
- Required courses: 12-15 courses (30 credit hours)
- Bridge courses:
 - If eligible, students can take up to three classes (six credit hours)
- Concentrations offered: higher education administration and instructional design



ELIGIBILITY AND REQUIREMENTS

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- Students must be at senior standing with 82 credit hours completed to begin bridge courses.

BACHELOR OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE → MASTER OF SCIENCE IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE

- Open to BCJ majors in criminal behavior, contemporary justice, corrections, homeland security and terrorism, justice administration and law enforcement as well as BA majors in government and national security.
- Format: Online
- Required courses: 10 courses (30 credit hours)
- Bridge courses: JUS510 and JUS525
 - If eligible, students can take up to two classes as an undergraduate to apply toward their graduate degree (up to six credit hours).
- Concentrations offered: crime analysis, crime science, criminal behavior, homeland security, homeland security administration and justice administration

BACHELOR OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN FORENSIC PSYCHOLOGY → MASTER OF SCIENCE IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE WITH A CONCENTRATION IN FORENSIC PSYCHOLOGY

- Open to BCJ majors in forensic psychology
- Format: On campus
- Required courses: 13 courses (42 credit hours)
- Bridge courses: PSY635 and PSY520
 - If eligible, students can take up to two classes as an undergraduate to apply toward their graduate degree (up to seven credit hours).

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN CYBERSECURITY → MASTER OF SCIENCE IN CYBERSECURITY

- Open to BS majors in cybersecurity
- Format: Online
- Required courses: 10 courses (30 credit hours)
- Bridge courses: CDS510 and CDS511
 - If eligible, students can take up to two classes as an undergraduate to apply toward their graduate degree (up to six credit hours).

BACHELOR OF ARTS IN PSYCHOLOGY → MASTER OF SCIENCE IN PSYCHOLOGY

- Open to BA majors in psychology
- Format: Online
- Required courses: 15 courses (41 credit hours)
- Bridge courses: PSY543 and PSY546
 - If eligible, students can take up to two classes as an undergraduate to apply toward their graduate degree (up to six credit hours).

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE → MASTER OF SCIENCE IN CLINICAL EXERCISE PHYSIOLOGY

- Open to BS majors biology, forensic science or exercise science
- Format: Online
- Required Courses: 12 courses (33 credit hours)
- Bridge Courses: CEP580, CEP605 & CEP575
 - If eligible, students can take up to three classes as an undergraduate to apply towards their graduate degree (up to nine credit hours).
